That's why everyday our Sisters work among the people of Kenya, begging for additional clothing for our children. *The needs are simple: blankets, jackets, hats and gloves*! Without these simple items, the results can be tragic.

I ask you today to stand with the Sisters.

Your gift relieves them of the burden of begging for our children and elderly, letting them do so much more for so many more people.

More than any other time of year, children die during these cold months from pneumonia. The elderly fare little better. <u>Something as simple as a warm meal and warm blanket saves a life!</u>

Please know also that <u>the people of Kenya try to help each other</u>. Like in America, there is good and evil, and while <u>God knows what's in someone's heart</u>, for us it is sometimes hard to tell.

Let me tell you a story of <u>an elderly couple who lives in our area.</u> <u>They were called miserly</u> by their neighbors. They raised vegetables and kept chickens. In a land where everyone bargains for a price, they never would, for anyone. NOT A PENNY'S DISCOUNT! <u>They always charged full price</u> for their eggs and vegetables.

Then I found out the real story... <u>they gave all their profits to two families nearby</u> who had so many troubles! Such deep charity! What compassion! <u>And no one knew</u> – not even those closest to them.

I tell you this because <u>God knows that there is always a way to provide</u> for our impoverished neighbors. Jesus told us that the poor would always be with us...orphans, widows and elderely. <u>He put that good couple</u>, and YOU, here to take care of them.
